Here are several inspiring stories from Matilda Goddard scholars in their own words:

OBINNA

A journey of a lifetime begins with a single step. Last year I was seated in the Great Hall at the Massachusetts State House – excited and proud to be the recipient of a scholarship from the Massachusetts Long Term Care Foundation. Having received both a Foundation scholarship and Matilda Goddard scholarships, I know what an honor this is and I congratulate all the Matilda Goddard Scholars on their achievements.

I am on a journey to build my career in long term care – a journey with many steps along the way. It began five years ago after my family moved to the United States from Nigeria. I was always interested in caring for others so I decided to enroll at Blue Hills Regional Technical School to become a Licensed Practical Nurse. With the support of my family, I completed the program and was hired into my first position as a nurse at Goddard House Skilled Nursing & Rehabilitation Center in Jamaica Plain.

In less than a year, I took another step and enrolled at Roxbury Community College in the

My journey to Goddard House in Brookline Assisted Living began when I was a child. Each day my mother would take me to visit my grandfather, who lived alone, to provide his personal care, meals, and social entertainment. As the youngest of three children, I was constantly surrounded by older people, including elderly neighbors, who lived alone. When I was in junior high school, I began to help a few of the neighborhood elders with housekeeping and shopping. Then in high school, I began volunteering in the activities department of a nursing home. These experiences revealed the greatness of older adults. I enjoyed their wisdom and advice, and respected what they had lived through to get where they were. Their stories exposed the resiliency required to reach old age.

After a stint in the Information Technology department of Daimler Chrysler in Germany, I felt a calling to work with the elderly. I returned to the United States and began to study counseling at Lesley University. While attending school, I searched for jobs that would allow me to

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Associate's degree RN program. I was promoted twice to become the Nurse Manager on the sub-acute and Alzheimer's units at Goddard House. It has been challenging and very fulfilling for me to supervise the care of residents and oversee the staff in a job that I love.

I anticipate becoming an RN this December and will further my nursing career by enrolling into the University of Massachusetts RN to MSN Master's degree program.

I have faith in tomorrow. It is not easy to go to school and work full time. I know for most of us the road may seem narrow and can be tough. But I wake up with faith, knowing fully well that the challenges of yesterday and the hard work of today will someday and somehow see us through. As I look down towards the end of the tunnel, I can see the light.

Remember, our caring makes life meaningful to people. I believe that one of the best ways of caring for people is by working in long term care. This is a sector of nursing where you don't just administer care, but you deeply touch the lives of people. That is the source of faith as I make my way on this journey.

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
work directly with elders and chose Goddard House in Brookline because of its history and the staff's genuine concern for residents.

As time went on, I began looking for ways to advance my career beyond the Program Director position while still having an impact on elder's lives. Nursing became a wonderful option as it offered me the opportunity to practice holistic care. The gift of nursing is that practitioners are able to help patients find ways to integrate their diagnosis into the fabric of their everyday lives. This is especially important in geriatrics, where many conditions are chronic. Nurses are able to assist elders in defining and maintaining health as they see it, as opposed to curative care, which is often not possible. One resident I work with described it perfectly when he called nurses *the navigators*, helping to guide patients as they travel down the road of life together.

Working towards a rewarding and challenging career, I have already completed my RN and am two years away from finishing my Master's, when I will be able to take the licensing boards to become a Nurse Practitioner. Recently I became Resident Care Manager at Goddard House in Brookline. My hope is to continue to provide exemplary, evidence-based, patient-centered care while advocating for health care change on a systemic level. I am grateful for the Matilda Goddard Scholarship to help me further my career.
