Spreading the Good News of Goddard House

 \mathbf{C} ome of the most enjoyable moments as a Omarketing director happen when members of our marketing team and I head out beyond our front gate to educate the public about this special community. Speaking at a local library, with Chamber of Commerce members, or at nearby senior centers-there are so many things to talk about. We share important chapters of our long history and some of the newest innovations our residents are now experiencing daily. There are seven core values created by the Goddard House Board of Trustees that set the stage for our outreach message. These values weave together our long commitment to care and our identity as a center of innovation.

With so many new senior living communities springing up around Boston and beyond, I believe it's impressive when people discover that Matilda Goddard founded The Home for Aged Women way back in 1849, and that Goddard House in Brookline is the current-day home of her original mission and vision. As the first health care organization of its kind in Massachusetts combined with the mission-driven, not-for-profit and non-sectarian identity, our culture as a charitable community quickly becomes evident to those in search of a special place for a beloved family member.

When we pair this strong 170-year history with the innovative programs and initiatives available to residents and staff at Goddard House, our message comes into greater focus. This first quarter of 2019 we have begun offering one-hour seminars and food tastings featuring the Brain Healthy Cooking program. Our management partner, Senior Living Residences (SLR), created this program and has provided us with excellent materials to enable us to offer a professional workshop to educate the local community. The Mediterranean Diet is the basis for this healthy lifestyle which has been shown to stave off or slow the process of dementia.

We head into March ready to feature next outreach phase, the Dementia Friendly Experience (DFE), also brought to us by Senior Living Residences. This initiative allows attendees to go through a set of everyday tasks such as paying a bill or organizing one's medications, while having artificial sensory deficits in place. The experience is designed to offer people without dementia a window of insight, and a chance for greater patience and empathy for those who live with dementia every day.

Other outreach efforts will include educating the public about such programs as Opening Minds Through Art, Growing the Farm at Goddard, and our Mindfulness classes. Lastly, our partnership with SAGE and our distinction as the first assisted living in Massachusetts to gain accreditation as an LGBT Friendly Senior Living Community will be another great feature of our Goddard outreach story.

Animation scenes are stored in folders which, when piled up, can be quite bulky. Ralph thought it was funny to load scenes in my arms high enough that I couldn't see where I was headed. One day, while walking down a corridor with a huge pile of animation, I ran into someone. "Why don't you watch where you're goin'?" said a rough voice.

That voice was instantly familiar. I peeked around the end of my load to see a short, elderly man with white hair. "Get out of my way or I'll moider ya!" I said. The man chuckled. It was Moe Howard, leader of The Three Stooges and one of my childhood heroes. Moe was there to discuss a possible appearance in our current film.

Work was over for the day. After I delivered the scenes to ink and paint, I sat with Moe as he told stories about his long career in vaudeville and the movies. He was an extremely kind man who welcomed talking with fans. It was an afternoon I'll never forget.
