# Creating a Master Plan for Goddard House

Many of our residents, family members, and associates participated in our strategic planning process during the summer and fall of 2019 and shared thoughts and ideas about Goddard House. Key themes from those important conversations were used to develop our 2020–2022 strategic plan ([www.goddardhouse.org/strategic-plan](http://www.goddardhouse.org/strategic-plan)).

During those sessions, a number of ideas to enhance our building and grounds were mentioned. As a result, the board of trustees concluded that Goddard House should engage an architectural firm to assist us with creating a building master plan. A master plan is a dynamic long-term planning document that provides a conceptual layout to guide future capital improvements.

The board established a building committee and, in the fall of 2020, interviewed several highly regarded firms with extensive experience in master planning. From that process, we were pleased to select DiMella Shaffer ([www.dimellashaffer.com](http://www.dimellashaffer.com)) as our architecture, planning and design firm.

As the first step in our master planning process, DiMella Shaffer performed a full assessment of Goddard in March and April of this year. They reviewed our strategic plan and other important documents, toured our building and site, assessed our building systems, and learned about our programs and services.

We then hosted a series of small focus groups with residents and family members, staff, management, community partners, and prospective residents. Led by DiMella Shaffer with Goddard House leaders in attendance, these focus groups allowed us to consider the insights/views of key constituents on our building and grounds, base the master plan design on sound decisions, and build the foundation for a successful project. Thank you to everyone who participated and shared your thoughts!

The DiMella Shaffer team gathered all of the information provided to them through these first

two steps and is now designing master plan concepts for consideration. Eventually, one or two concepts and the corresponding cost estimates will be shared with the building committee. The concepts will also be presented to the Town of Brookline for their feedback. The planning process will culminate with the presentation of a final conceptual plan to the board of trustees, most likely in the fall.

This is an exciting time in the history of Goddard House and we look forward to keeping you updated on our progress with the master plan. Your continued input is invaluable and will help ensure a well-designed plan for our beloved community! 🏡

## Board Spotlight



Reverend **Mark Caggiano** joined the Goddard House board in 2012 and serves on the building committee and the recently formed diversity, equity and inclusion committee. The building

committee makes recommendations to the board relative to the master plan and other key issues regarding our building and grounds. “At Goddard House, we have strived over the years to maintain a welcoming environment for our residents and employees alike,” says Mark.

Mark is an ordained minister serving the First Church in Chestnut Hill. He is a graduate of Harvard College and Harvard Divinity School. Mark is also a graduate of Boston College Law School, and in a prior life was a Boston attorney and taught First Amendment law at BC. He has recently completed a book, *Faith on Trial: Religion and the Law in American Society*. The book explores the evolution of religious rights through American history and examines modern trends broadening such rights and eroding the wall separating “church and state.”



## Pride Month at Goddard House

The event that galvanized the gay rights movement occurred June 28, 1969, at the Stonewall Inn in New York's Greenwich Village. Police raided the establishment, which was a popular gathering place for the LGBTQ community. They arrested employees and patrons of the bar while pedestrians watched. Riots ensued in response, lasting about five days. In reaction to the Stonewall Riots, organizers proposed the idea of a march in order to build on the spirit of resistance. As a result, on the first anniversary of the Stonewall riots, a "Gay Pride" march was organized in the heart of New York City's gay community as a counterpoint to the prevailing attitude of shame. The Pride march in New York inspired others to occur across the country in solidarity. Thereafter, gay pride celebrations expanded globally. In the United States, LGBTQ Pride is a monthlong celebration, with marches occurring throughout the month of June.

### Goddard House Pride

In June 2019, Goddard House kicked off its first annual LGBT Pride event by proudly raising the trademark rainbow flag cheered on by residents, families and community members. The ceremony represented a double celebration as Goddard House staff had just completed a training program to become the first assisted living community in Massachusetts to obtain LGBT Cultural Competency Accreditation through SAGECare to better serve LGBT older adults. More than 80% of managers and frontline staff at Goddard House completed training, giving the community a Platinum ranking, on how best to support LGBT older adults, and create and maintain an inclusive community.

Goddard House has supported the LGBT community in other ways as well. Over the past five years, we have partnered with ETHOS to provide a low-cost brunch for LGBT older adults here at Goddard House. Now paused due to the pandemic, typically one Saturday each month we serve as a safe and welcoming meal site for people to gather with each other. Goddard House has also been a sponsor and advocate of LGBT independent film maker Stu Maddux who directed the acclaimed film *Gen Silent*. The film captures the plight of LGBT elders who grew up in an era of social intolerance towards their lifestyle which has left a generation of people with emotional scars. This history makes joining even a progressive community such as Goddard House a move requiring a bold step of courage. 

## LGBTQ Movie Festival
