### Phyllis Vineyard's Exemplary Service to Goddard House

It's that time of year that Goddard House selects two staff members to receive the Phyllis Vineyard award for exemplary service. We sat down with Phyllis recently to learn more about her own exemplary service to Goddard House. Phyllis served on the Goddard House Board of Trustees for 20 years. When she joined the board in 1988, Goddard House was a skilled nursing facility in Jamaica Plain. Phyllis created and chaired an Ethics Committee to provide guidance in

addressing ethical issues that arise in patient care and to help facilitate sound decision making that respects patients' values, concerns and interests.

Over the years, Phyllis championed the well-being of the associates. After she retired from the board in 2011, Goddard House created the annual

Phyllis Vineyard Award for Exemplary Service. The award is granted to two exemplary employees who demonstrate excellence and commitment in service to our residents and the Goddard House Community.

#### When and why did you join the Goddard House Board?

I was invited to join the Board in 1988 by Barbara Grossman, who was Goddard House board president at that time. Barbara knew about my medical ethics background and my role on the ethics committee of Brigham and Women's Hospital. I had worked in medical research for 10 years, including in a Brigham and Women's research lab.

#### What was Goddard House like in the late 1980s?

At the time, all of the residents were women. Many of them had never married. Most of the care staff were women. In 1985, the business name under which Home for Aged Women, Inc. operated became Goddard House. It was during my tenure on the Board that I witnessed the first admissions of men and non-white women residents.

Many of the board members, some of whom were social workers, worked directly with the staff at Goddard House then. One board member, Mouse Rowley, ran a store on the first floor and sold items out of a cart that she would wheel around the building. She was helped by Dorinda Burrows, who was also on the board. They had a wonderful rapport with the residents.

# Tell us about your passion for taking care of those who take care of others.

Social justice has always been an interest of mine. When I first came on the Board, I saw right away the strong bonds between the staff and the residents. As a result, the staff was strongly affected when residents passed away – particularly those residents without any family. So, I focused immediately on the staff because if they are happy and supported, the residents get better care. I brought in a Unitarian Minister, the Reverend Joseph Bassett, as a board member. Together we wrote a memorial service for the staff that included the opportunity to share memories and deliver readings to enable them to celebrate the residents who passed away.

# What stands out to you in your 30+ year affiliation with Goddard House?

I believe that nonprofits are much more professionally run today and Goddard House is no exception. Collaboration between the board and management is the key to success. What has been consistent, however, are the priorities of making sure the residents and staff are well-treated and happy. I feel today as I did then that the staff members at Goddard House are all gifted.

Phyllis, thank you for your exemplary service to Goddard House!
