## Opening Minds through Art

Back with a New Exhibit at Gallery M by Happy Artists Gang

pening Minds through Art (OMA) is an intergenerational art program for people living with memory loss that was developed by Dr. Like Lokon at the Scripps Gerontology Center at Miami University in Ohio. Grounded in person-centered ethics, it was founded on the fact that people living with dementia can express themselves creatively, in this case artistically. The mission of OMA is to build a bridge across cognitive barriers and age through art. Each artist is partnered with a trained volunteer on a one-to-one basis, supporting them but with a step-by-step, "hands-off" approach, so that the artist creates the artwork independently. Goddard House associates Jennifer Miller and Ginny Mazur trained with Dr. Lokon to become the first OMA facilitators in Massachusetts.

It's been quite a year for OMA at Goddard House! In the fall of 2017, our pilot of OMA at Goddard House received the Program Innovation of the Year Award from LeadingAGE Massachusetts. Now we're excited to host our second exhibit of works by a new team of Olmsted Place artists: Susan, Zona, Linda and Walter. Mimi attended occasionally.

From the start, this team of artists declared themselves "bold," a fitting descriptive. The group rejected the name "OMA" and retitled themselves as "Happy Artists Gang." Their motto became, "Everything Goes." Appreciating the abstract approach, Walter noted, "Imagination is a great thing. It's interesting how you can do things here that you never imagined before." Linda added, "One thing turns into another and into a great adventure."

The team's bold attitude overrode their uncertainties, time and again. Zo made a self-discovery: "I've always felt unartistic...but this proves me wrong!" Susan concurred: "I was unsure about what I was making, but look, it came out—great!"

It sure has! The Happy Artists Gang exhibits their work on the walls of Gallery M at Goddard House throughout March and April 2018 with a reception for the artists on Saturday, March 17<sup>th</sup> from 3:00–4:30 P.M. Artwork will be for sale with details posted.

### **Operation Renovation**

During the month of January and well into March, Goddard House has been filled with the sights and sounds of construction and renovation. Electricians, plumbers, painters, carpet installers, wallpaper hangers and interior decorators have descended upon our community to bring fresh new looks and colors to the life of this beautiful building. It's a refreshed look on this special place our residents will continue to call home.

As a community, a renovation is all at once an exciting adventure and a test of patience and good graces. Schedules have been disrupted and programs have temporarily been moved to new spaces to carry on. Residents have needed to check the video schedule in the lobby more frequently to be sure they were in the right place at the right time for their favorite activity or program. Lots of workers in and out of the building and various trucks parked outside have also presented other challenges. Through it all, that neighborly spirit has been required and lots of news updates from the director and all associates have become regular events. As I write this article however, we are closing in on the finish line, turning 'round third base and home plate is coming into view.

In the meantime—Goddard House was being transformed. I've included a few photos here. They are meant only to be teasers so you will come for a visit to get the full effect. New carpeting, furniture, window and wall treatments have redefined the entire first floor of the Traditional section of our community. As I take my walks around the building these days it is fun to hear the oohs! and aahs! being expressed by residents, staff,

As interim executive director for this past year, I have been witness to this large-scale renovation project as perhaps the most observable indicator of the strong collaboration between our devoted Goddard House Board of Trustees and the expertise of Senior Living Residences (SLR). The choosing of colors, fabrics, furniture and fixtures in thoughtful ways—while simultaneously choosing the right vendors and installers who are adept at performing their work in ways that minimally impact our residents' daily life—requires strong doses of trust and respect between these two caring groups that lead this community.

I'm reminded of a quote that describes our founder and namesake, Matilda Goddard. Matilda, who served as the chair of Board of Trustees for 51 years, was said to have such devotion to the mission of the Goddard House that no "trifle" was too small for her concern. As we finish this first phase of our renovation and embark upon the next within our Olmsted Place setting, I am confident that Matilda would be comforted by the attention given to the many small, but important details these projects require.
