#### All Star Red Sox Pitcher Luis **Tiant Visits Goddard House:** Major League Memories

n September 17<sup>th</sup> Goddard House was buzzing with anticipation for the impending arrival of the former All-Star Red Sox pitcher, Mr. Luis Tiant. At 9:55 A.M., someone mentioned that a large black SUV had just pulled up by the main entrance...

Our memory support neighborhood, Olmsted Place, had been specially chosen by the Alzheimer's Association and The Boston Red Sox as a pilot site for their new Major League Memories program. The Alzheimer's Association had done this twice before in Los Angeles and Chicago with great success. With the Greater Boston Walk to End Alzheimer's on the horizon and our own home-grown fund-raiser we call "The Mini Walk" set for Sept 27<sup>th</sup>, the timing for the Major League Memories program was perfect.

The program features a retired ball player visiting the residents of a memory care neighborhood to spark memories and reminisce about baseball and the part the sport has played in many of our lives as youngsters and adults. Luis Tiant was in his prime as a player in the late 1960's and 1970's. His stylistic pitching form was well-known back during his days on the mound at Fenway Park.

... Then he walked through the main entrance doors. He was here, at Goddard House. His genuine warmth and kindness was palpable as he greeted residents and associates. He showed video clips from his playing days, he autographed photos and caps and handed out Red Sox teddy bears to everyone. Never in a rush, but rather patient, kind and affectionate with all.

Melissa Shirtcliff of the Alzheimer's Association, Red Sox mascot Wally the Green Monster, and Dick Flavin, storied Fenway Park announcer and poet laureate were also part of the team organizing this event. We thank them all for choosing Goddard House to host such a one-of-a-kind event. A special
