Occasionally one of my grandparents would mention that they had grown up in a different world than the current one. I recall thinking that was an exaggeration. These days, I'm not so sure.

My family lived in Forest Hills, a suburb of Queens, New York. Our house was on a circle along with eight other houses. Every night, after dinner, we raced outside to ride bicycles and explore the neighborhood. "Be sure to come home when the streetlights come on." Mom would say.

Never mind iPhones and computers. If one of us did something wrong, the news traveled "the mom network" with deadly speed and accuracy. By the time we came home, we'd been found guilty and were waiting for Dad to return from work. The anticipation was usually far worse than any punishment.

Each morning, the Dellwood Man would deliver milk, cottage cheese, cream and eggs. Our house had been constructed in the 30's. Built into the house, in the backyard by the gate, was what looked like a safe. Inside the kitchen, the milk box was under the counter. One could collect the daily dairy delivery without going outside. My cat, Tom, loved to curl up inside the box. When the hapless milkman arrived, Tom would spring out and we'd hear a crash!

Bread and donuts were delivered by The Dugan Man. The sound of chimes would bring kids sprinting to greet The Good Humor Man in his sparkling white truck. Occasionally, a knife sharpener would trundle around the circle pulling his cart.

These days, I sometimes catch myself thinking about the vastly different world in which I grew up. Grandpa and Grandma knew what they were talking about.
