RESIDENT PROFILE

Myrna Balk was born in St. Louis,
Missouri. Her mother immigrated
from Russia/Poland and her father
was rooted in the St. Louis Jewish
community. From them she learned
the mindset of believing in herself and
getting things done. Myrna was inspired

by her father, who ran a newspaper route and motivated his employees to succeed in school by rewarding them with a new suit after graduating high school.

Myrna attended the University of Iowa. Discouraged by the administration not allowing her to room with a foreign student, she ran and was elected for student government, and introduced reforms, including nondiscrimination clauses. She went on to be accepted into the social work program at Case Western Reserve on the basis of her political activity. She held several roles in the social work field, including in New York working with mothers with incarcerated children, and in Kathmandu where she acquired donations of social work books for schools there. Myrna was drawn to Boston State Hospital after reading an article about the director, whose approach aligned with hers. Myrna is an artist, creating political art exploring issues of sex trafficking and discrimination which she was invited to show at the UN.

She has two wonderful children, with whom she appreciates having regular contact, and is a proud grandmother! Myrna values making people feel welcomed, and forming new friendships. Myrna, we're glad to have your warm, outgoing personality at Goddard House!

GHCI and SpeakEasy Stage Company Spotlight Arts, Wellness, and Connection with **OMA** Artwork

Noddard House Community Initiatives (GHCI) teamed up with SpeakEasy Stage Company for an interactive panel discussion, Artmaking and Well-Being: The Benefits of Art on the Mind & Body, following the East Coast premiere of Pulitzer Prize-nominated playwright Steven Drukman's Pru Payne on November 10 at the Calderwood Pavilion, Boston Center for the Arts.

The play, which delves into love, memory loss, and the resilience of human connection, set the stage for an engaging exploration of the therapeutic power of how engaging in the arts fosters connection and wellbeing.
