RESIDENT PROFILE

Born in Wilmington, Delaware, Gwen
Nelson moved to upstate New York at
age seven to live with her mother, who
was a photographer and machinist—
one of only two women working in
the machine shop. Her stepfather was

a machinist, and her father a champion pugilist (boxer) and professional hockey player. Gwen attended convent boarding school in Pittsburgh, and in high school was active as a basketball player, majorette, and cheerleader. While attending Western Michigan University, Gwen worked three jobs and later transferred to the University of Detroit, where she earned an education and liberal arts degree.

Gwen went on to live in New York state with her son, and was a high school teacher for 34 years in Syracuse and Rochester, as well as in Michigan. While teaching, Gwen volunteered for 20 years at prisons, meeting with prisoners as a group to examine their lives with a new perspective. She also volunteered at an NPR radio station, reading aloud for blind listeners.

Gwen rode a Yamaha 250 motorcycle for nine years! She spent summers working at peace camps in Romania and Hungary with the Bridges for Education program, and went on bicycle trips throughout Europe. She has fond memories of the eight months she spent traveling in a sailboat between Lake Ontario and The Bahamas. Gwen remains close with her sister, Max, values staying active and engaged, and approaches situations with a wonderful sense of humor. Gwen, we are happy to have you at Goddard House!

Cynthia challenges traditional artistic methods, searching for new ways to see the world. Her creative process is rooted in observation, bringing

"the challenge of defining what is 'real.' " She says, "Removing boundaries pushes me to question my own limitations and conventions."

Focusing on nature and everyday objects, Cynthia explores themes of transition, metamorphosis, and growth through drawing, oil painting, watercolor, mixed media, and lithography. She studied at Pratt Institute before earning a BFA and MFA in painting from Boston University and later a second MFA in illustration at the School of Visual Arts in New York. A co-founder of the Brickbottom Artists Association, she maintained

a Somerville studio for 38 years, and has been featured at a wide range of venues including the permanent collection at the Danforth Museum. Her editorial illustrations have



appeared in The New York Times, The Boston Globe, The National Law Journal, and The Washington Post.
